2022 New Laws

The new year brought in two new changes in state law regarding public safety.

Driving After Suspension

The first change is that Minnesota will no longer suspend someone's driver's license following a conviction for driving under suspension, driving after revocation, or failing to pay for a traffic ticket, parking fine, or parking citation.

Civil Forfeiture

Minnesota's Civil forfeiture laws received multiple changes including:

Forfeiture notices must warn a person who had a vested interest in the vehicle, they can submit an innocent owner claim,

Forfeiture proceedings in the case of a DWI is stopped if the driver participates in the ignition interlock program.



The law identifies specific ways law enforcement agencies can use forfeiture money,

The law states that a vehicle is subject to forfeiture if used in the transportation or exchange of controlled substances for distribution or sale if the value of the controlled substances is at least \$100.00.



2021 Traffic Deaths

2021 was the deadliest year on Minnesota's highways since 2007 according to the Minnesota Department of Public Safety (DPS).

497 people died on Minnesota roads according to the preliminary numbers. This is a sharp increase over the average number of 378 deaths from 2016 to 2020.

The DPS reports that speed was the largest contributing factor in the traffic fatalities, accounting for 162 deaths, or almost 1/3 of all fatal accidents.

109 of the fatalities involved someone who was not using a seatbelt.

67 motorcyclists, 58 pedestrians, and 9 bicyclists were also killed in 2021.

Impaired driving deaths dropped from 135 in 2020 to 124 in 2021. Distracted driving deaths also decreased from 32 in 2020 to 24 in 2021.

Scam Alert: Fake AT&T Text Messages

Recently several Worthington residents have been receiving fake text messages pretending to be from AT&T.

Some of the text messages will thank you for a recent payment while other text messages will claim that you have failed to make a payment and they will shut off your phone service.

What both types of text messages have in common is that they want you to click on a link in the message.

Once you click on the message, several things could happen.

One possibility is that some type of malware could be downloaded onto your cellular telephone.

Another possibility is that they will want you to enter your log in credentials in order to hijack your account so the scammer can order phones and other products on your account.

If you receive a text like this, simply erase it. If you are worried that you missed a payment, simply call your cellular telephone provider, and verify with them your account is current.

Ask an Officer: Workplace Discrimination and Other Issues

Why can't the police help me if I am being discriminated against at work?

Most workplace issues are considered civil issues under Minnesota State Law and under Federal Law.

If you believe you are being treated unfairly at work, you should start by talking with your direct supervisor and explain your concerns in a calm and factual manner.

If that does not work, then try to talk with the company personnel department or higher-level supervisor.

If you are unable to resolve your issue with your employer,

Minnesota has several agencies that can help you with your concerns.

If your concern is about potential safety violations, you can contact the local Minnesota Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA).

If you have a concern about paychecks or wages, breaks, overtime, and other workplace concerns, you can contact the Minnesota Department of Labor and Industry.

If you believe you are being discriminated based on protected class, such as race, color, religion, sex, disability, or other protected status, you can contact the Minnesota Department of Human Rights.

You can also reach out to an attorney for advice and help in resolving your concerns.

The IRS states that if you steal property, you must report its' fair market value in your income in the year you steal it, unless in the same year, you return it to the rightful owner.



Make sure you are reporting your illegal activities this year, or the IRS may come knocking on your door!
