
# **Officer Phil Butenhoff**

# Law Review: Vehicle Horn Noise Complaints

Each year, the Worthington Police Department receives noise complaints from frustrated neighbors woken up by someone honking their car horn when picking up someone for work. Not only is this conduct annoying for the neighbors of these people, but it is in violation of two Worthington city ordinances.

This conduct is in violation of ordinance 92.55, which prohibits any unnecessary noise that disturbs the comfort of others. It is also in violation of ordinance 130.01, which prohibits the making or production of unnecessary noise, including the blowing of any automotive or vehicle horn.

# Scam Alert: Public Wi-Fi

A new scam that is starting to show up is the free Wi-Fi scam.

The scam works when you go to a public place and look for an internet hot spot to surf the web.

You may find a Wi-Fi connection named "Free Wi-Fi" or something similar and when you connect to it, you can fall victim to the scam.

The problem is that the Wi-Fi connection is not a Wi-Fi connection, but a peer-to-peer network, where the scammer allows you to browse the internet with his connection.

When you use the scammers internet connection, all of the traffic goes through his computer and he can see everything you do online.

This includes showing the scammer all of your user names and passwords that you enter for any websites you browse, including financial and other sites.

If this wasn't bad enough, because they are connected to your computer, they can see all of your files and plant malware on your computer.

The best way to protect yourself from this scam is to not use any free Wi-Fi connections that you are not familiar with.

### **Halloween Safety Tips**

It's hard to believe, but Halloween is just around the corner and it is time to talk about safety.

- Put the electronic devices down! Not only can they be a distraction for the children, but they also affect night vision, making it more difficult to see potential danger.
- Cross the street only at corners, using crosswalks and traffic signals.
- Always walk on sidewalks and paths where available. If there are no sidewalks, walk facing traffic and as close to the curb as possible.

- Watch for cars that are turning or backing up. Teach your children to never dart out into the street or to cross the street between parked cars.
- Decorate costumes and bags with reflective tape or stickers and if possible, use light colored costumes.
- Choose face paint and makeup whenever possible instead of masks, which can obstruct and limit a child's vision.
- For motorists, slow down and be especially alert in residential neighborhoods.

• Take extra time to look for children in intersections, medians, and curbs.
